What is year 3 like?

A 'step up' from year 2.

Moving up a Key Stage will be an adjustment for your children. The curriculum becomes more demanding as it builds on the foundations laid down in Key Stage 1, introduces new concepts and learning strategies, and encourages children to draw on and develop a broad range of skills and ways of thinking.

We have high expectations of children throughout the school. This is emphasised in KS2 in terms of the children being expected to set an example to those younger than themselves (for example when reading with Reception class) and being encouraged to work and act with greater independence.

The school day and timetable are also different, which can feel like quite a big change to get used to at first.

Some of the things that are different in KS2 -

- A slightly longer school day, finishing at 3:30pm
- Morning playtime is at 10:40am with the rest of KS2
- Children need to bring in their own fruit for morning snack
- Children will begin to learn French
- Children are able to join choir and orchestra
- Year 3 present the school Harvest Festival (Wednesday 9th October 2.30 pm)

Routines

At the start of the day: Children are expected to put their book-bags on their pegs, enter the classroom sensibly, and work quietly on their "morning challenge" while the register is taken. Reading books can also be changed in class during this time.

At the end of the day: We will escort the children outside and will ask them to point out where their parent is standing before they leave the green gate.

Please let whichever member of staff is at the gate in the morning know of any different going home arrangements and please remember to call the office and let them know if arrangements change during the school day.

Topics

Topics covered will be: What happened in 1066?; A different place (Inverness); Mighty Mountains; Stone Age to Iron Age; The history of our school; Who lives here?.

Reading

Every morning, we have whole class guided reading time where we read and discuss our class book together. Children will have a chance to read aloud and we will also be having parent volunteers hear a group read each day between 8.50am and 9.30am. As the half term progresses, a group will also begin to read with their Reception buddies each day.

The focus in KS2 is much more on inference, deduction and prediction, so when reading with your child, please try to ask questions to assist and check their understanding. Moving through the book bands will now be much more based on levels of comprehension than on decoding.

Maths

Autumn Term: place value- working with numbers up to 1000, placing a 3 digit number on a numberline, addition and subtraction- introduction of column addition and subtraction, multiplication and division

Spring Term: length and perimeter, fractions- counting on a fraction numberline, ordering non-unit fractions, mass and capacity, multiplication

Summer Term: fractions- unit and non-unit fractions of a set of objects, money, telling the time, 2D and 3D shape, statistics, multiplication

PSHE

You will find a summary of the content of the Year 3 topics on the PSHE subject page on the website. We often use picture books or slides as a way into a discussion. The most challenging is 'Some Secrets Should Never be Kept' by Jayneen Sanders. We read this in the Spring Term in the context of Personal Safety and the difference between a secret that feels safe and unsafe. We will let you know in advance the day we read it to the children.

PE

Year 3 PE days are Tuesday and Thursday. Children should come to school wearing their named PE kit on Tuesdays and Thursdays. This should be:

- A pair of socks, suitable footwear, shorts and their house t- shirt or a white t-shirt and, as appropriate, warm outer clothes, for example a tracksuit or leggings and a sweatshirt (not a school sweatshirt)
- No jewellery - ear studs should be removed
- Long hair tied back.

Homework

The children will be expected to read at home for 10 minutes on a daily basis and parents or children can record the books they read in their reading record. Books can be changed when they are finished (at least once a week).

There will also be home challenges posted on the class page of the website each half term.

These are optional activities to do at home and generally are brought in to show the rest of the class during the final week of each half term.

The times tables that we focus on in Year 3 are 2,3,4,5,8,10. As we get nearer to the Year 4 times tables testing, any additional practice at home would be brilliant. We follow a spelling programme where words are not sent home, but worked on and practised in school.

Communication

We will be outside at the end of every school day if you wish to discuss anything. Should you wish to discuss anything at greater length, please speak to us to arrange a suitable time.
